- He has a peroxisomal biogenesis disorder in the Zellweger spectrum (PBD-ZSD).
- Skeletal/Femur length abnormalities diagnosed in utero. Jaundice, feeding issues and orthopedic issues present at birth.
- First eye surgery at 6 months and first seizure at 8 months.
- Failure to thrive, pneumonia, and liver disease led to testing and elevated VLCFA's led to diagnosis of peroxisomal disorder.
- Diagnosed unknown type of PD at 18 months and confirmed ZSD at age 5 by Dr. Hugo Moser and Steven Steinberg at age 5 years.
